## **Overview**

Okay, you've made it through Chapter One — congratulations! Now we're going to narrow our focus. In Chapter Two, we'll cover five lessons that address specific changes in the way educators work together to make sure school and district programming is responsive to current changes and trends that affect college and career success.
